A healthy man presents with a tender subcutaneous nodule on his hand that appeared after cleaning his aquarium. What is the most likely diagnosis?

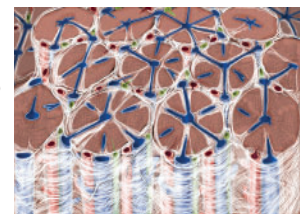
